

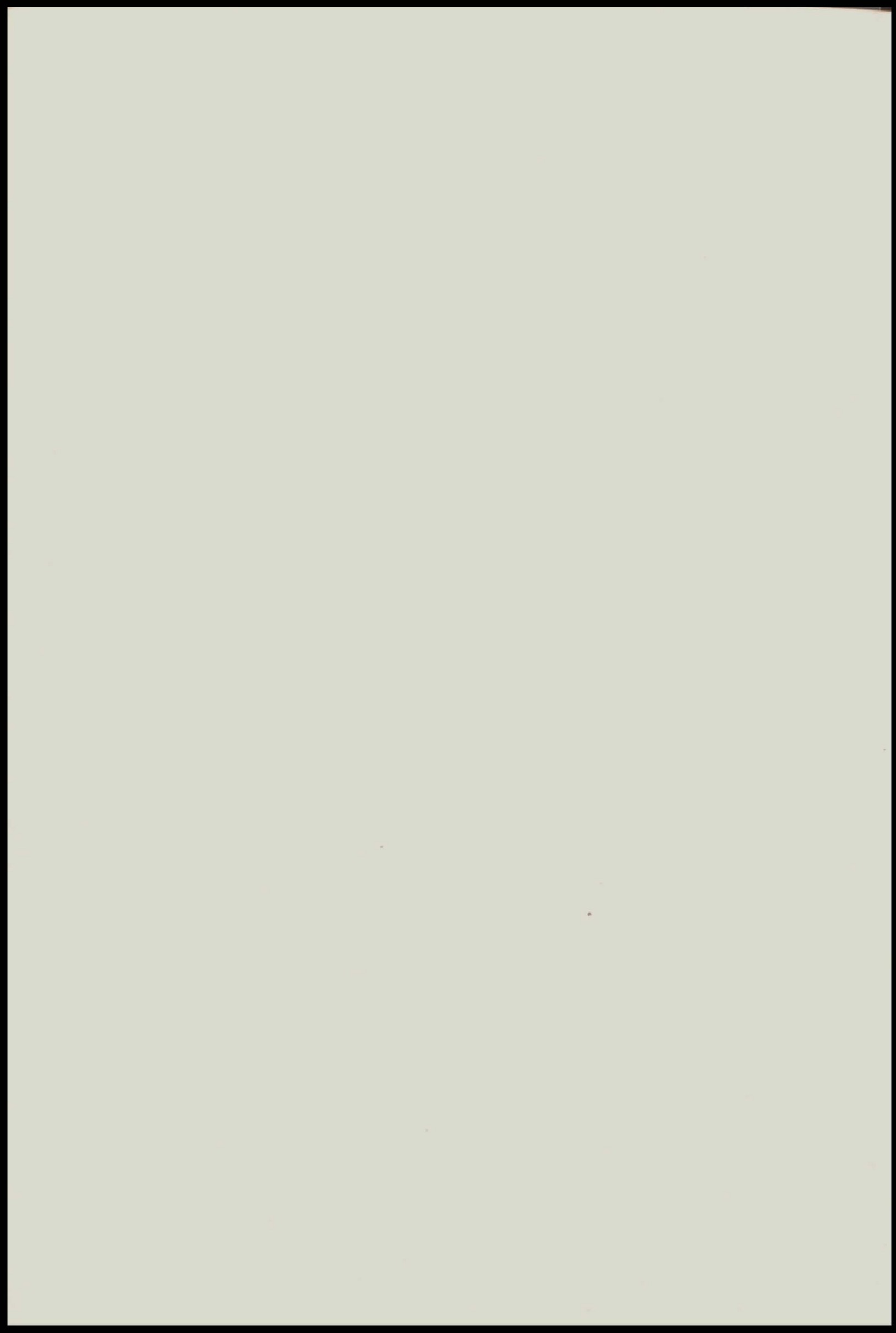

EDITORIAL

However, there is a great deal more to living within the school community than academic achievement. An important relationship exists between the young man and his school. Each has an obligation towards the other and unless full cooperation is exercised, all work is in vain.

Education is a difficult and trying business for both the school and the student. The school, in educating an individual, must take into consideration many factors, some of which may make it necessary to alter the academic program. The student finds that education requires a great deal of effort on his part. The realization of his personal gains assures him that his effort is not at all in vain.

Another important aspect of this relationship is the young man's attitude towards his school. He must be capable of evaluating a situation with an open mind not relying on prejudiced opinions. A biased evaluation can hinder the young man's academic work and can alter his attitude towards the school.

Today, secondary school education plays a vital role in preparing a young man for further education. His success in college will depend mainly upon his desire to learn, and his ability to adjust to changing conditions. The primary function of a college preparatory school is to develop the young man's character, and give meaning to the purpose of future education.

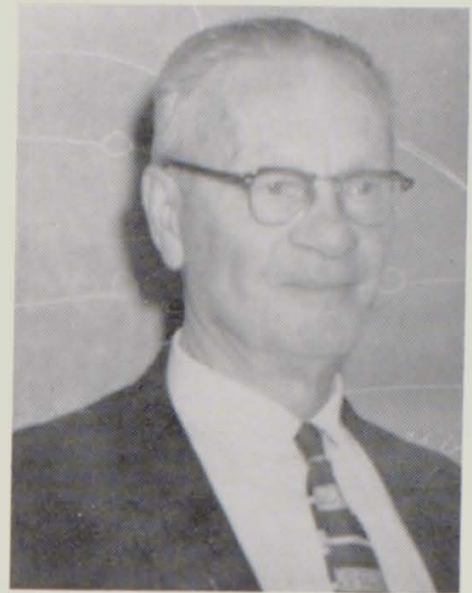


WILLIAM A. REIFSNYDER

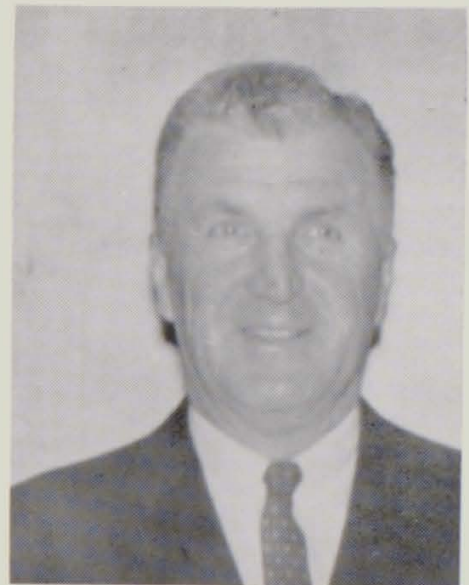
To you, Mr. Reifsnyder, we say, 'Thank you' for your untiring efforts put into making our secondary school days so profitable.

STEPHEN VAN RENSSELAER CAMMANN

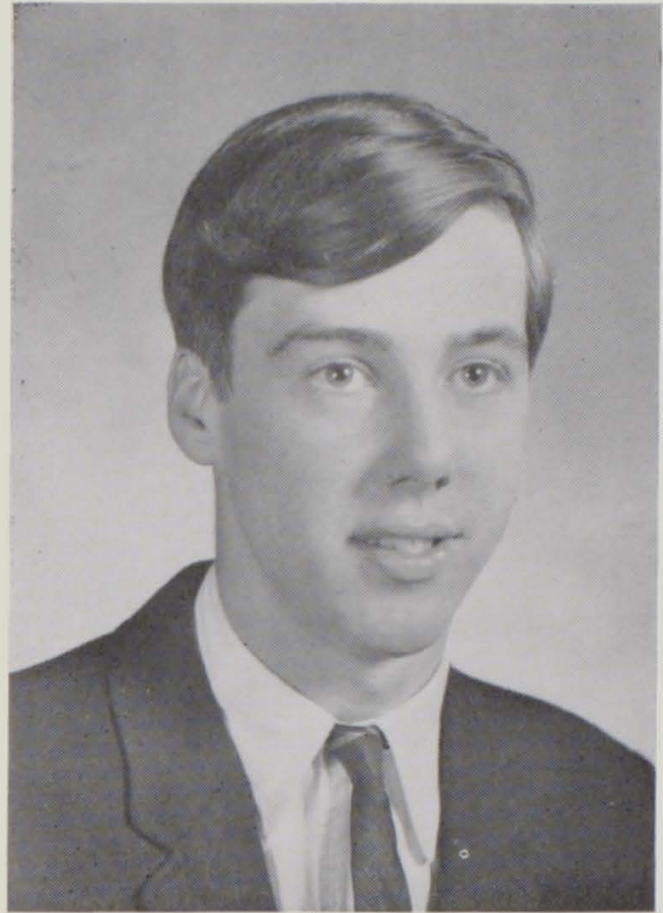

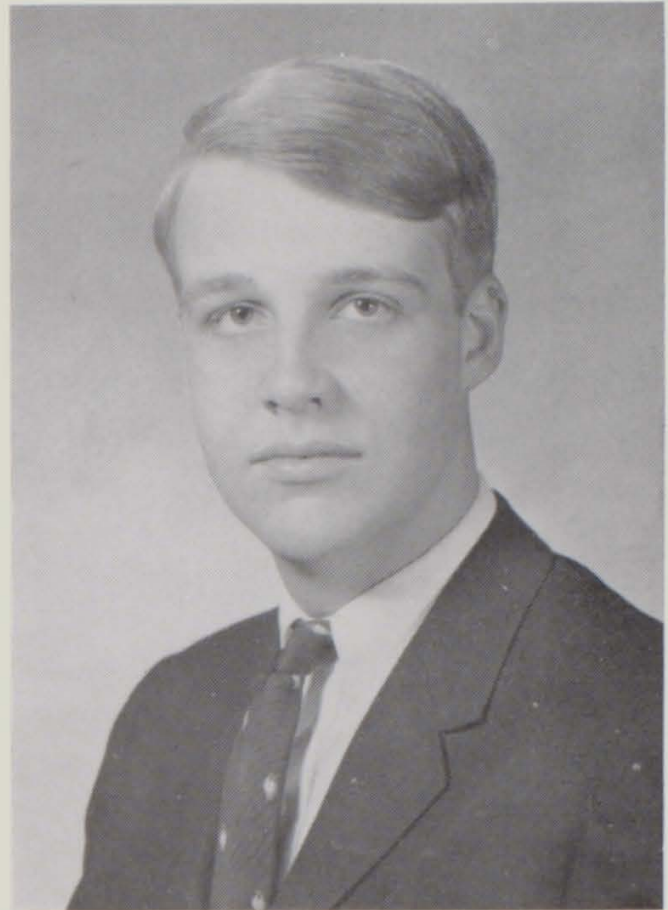
Randy's activities in the art club have proved his talent in that field many times over.

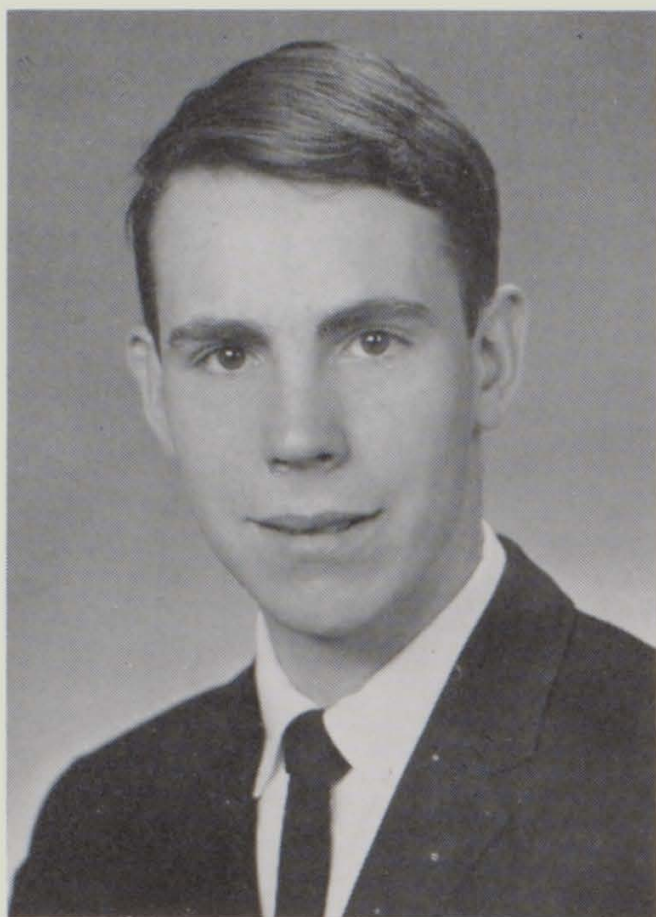


RAYMOND WHITFORD HULL II

Among the present Sixth Form there are only three boys remaining from the original Third Form class of four years ago. John has the distinction of being one of this group.

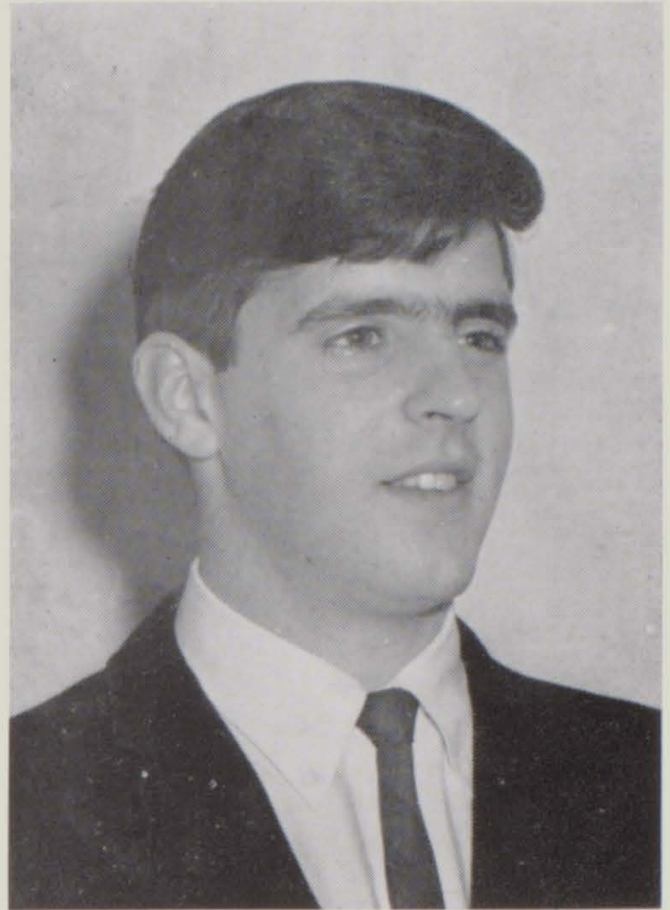

LARRY CHARLES POZEFSKY

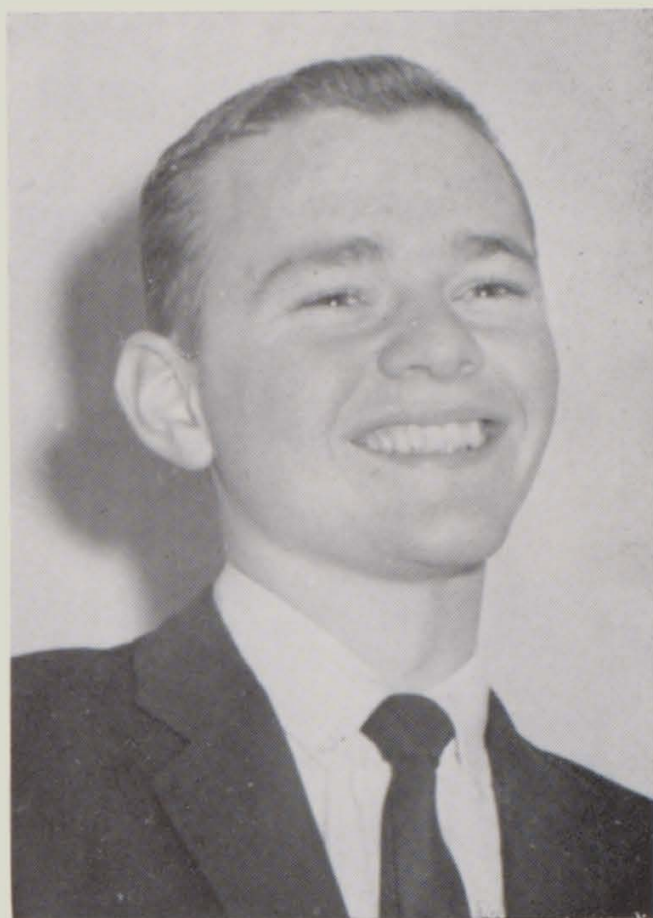

Larry's primary interest in sports is running—cross-country and track. He is a spirited runner and practices hard. In the Winter Term, Larry participated in wrestling.

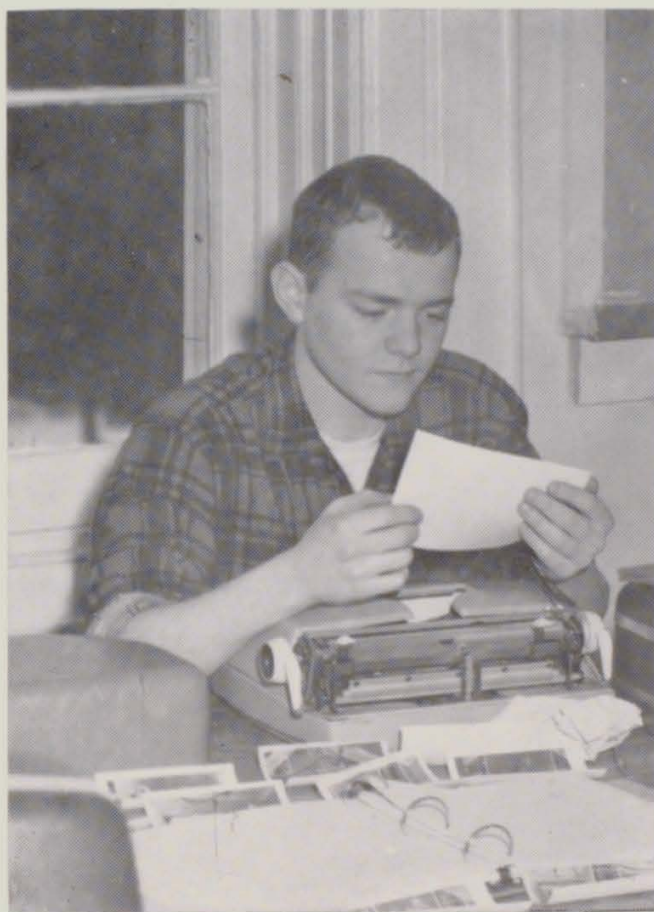
Larry is noted for his easy-going, likeable, friendly personality. With these assets we know that Larry will be a success.

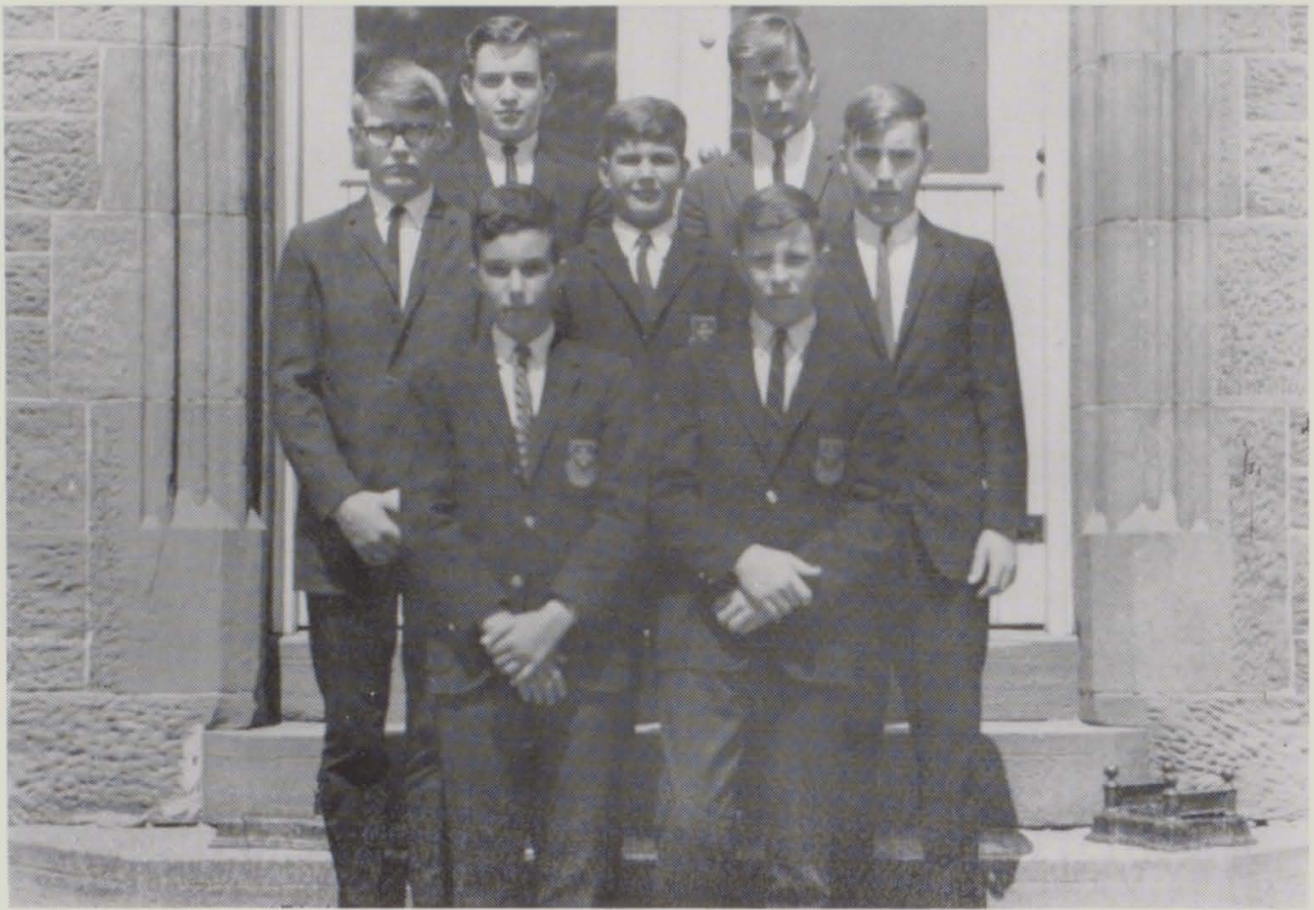

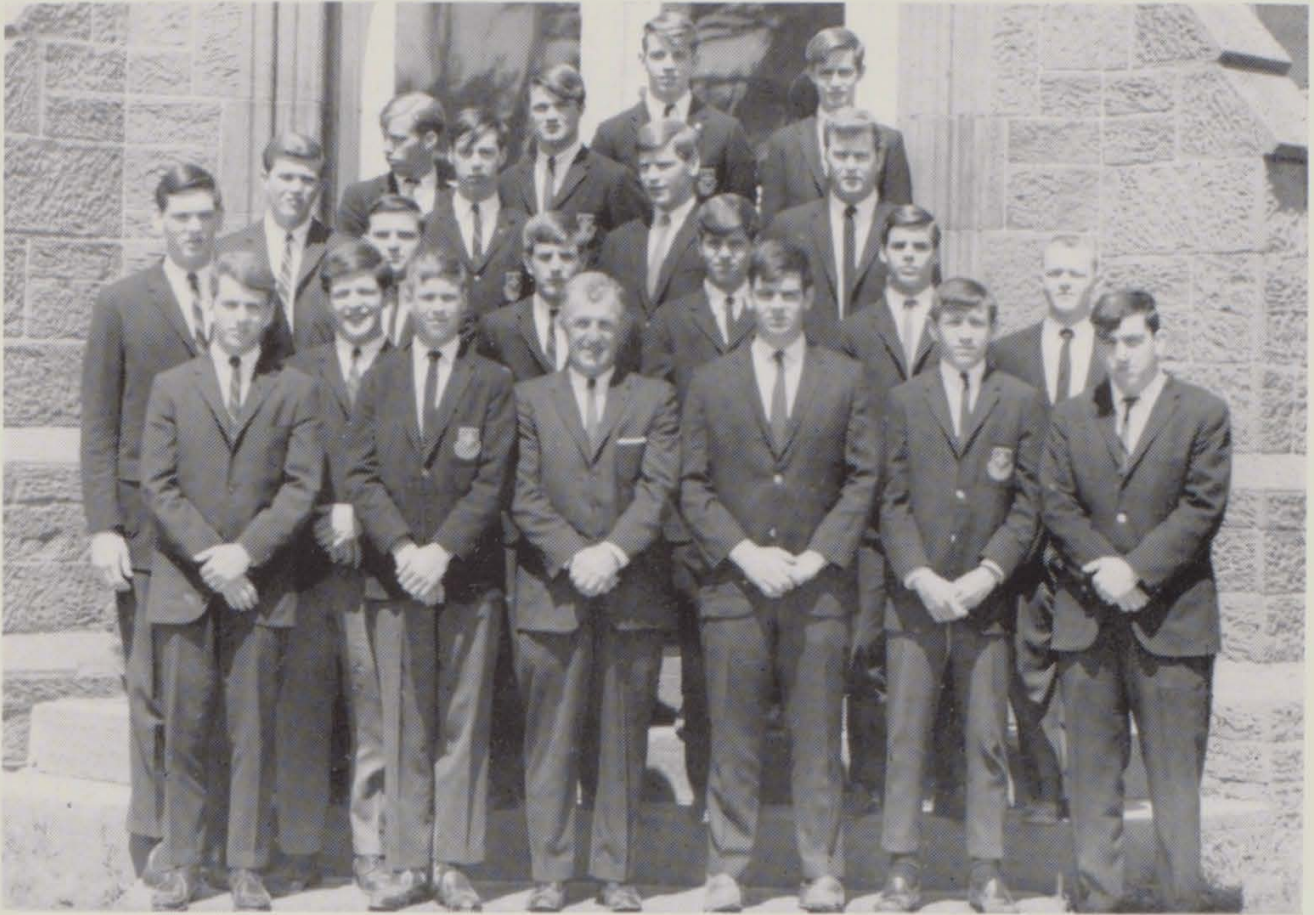

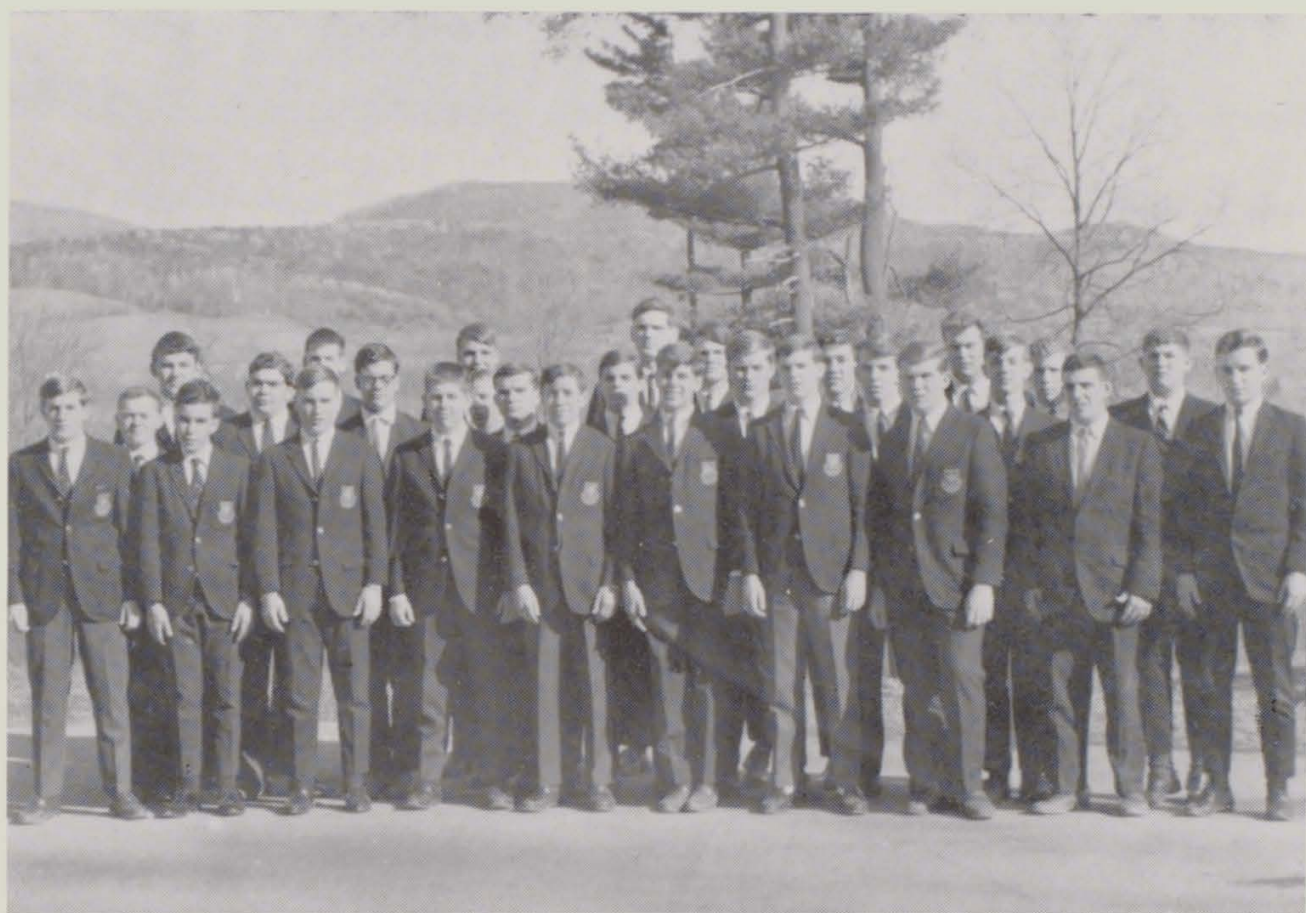

THE BOAR'S HEAD - YULE LOG CELEBRATION

This year, marking the revival of the festival in the setting of the newly constructed and completed Memorial Hall, Hoosac School celebrated its seventy-second consecutive observance of the Boar's Head - Yule Log Festival.

The ceremony began with the singing of "The Cherry Tree Carol" by Seward Allison. During this, the Senior Prefect, John Millar, lighted the old Yule Candle, which, in turn, was used to ignite the new Yule Candle by the Senior Master, Mr. Wood. With tapers lighted from the new candle, the Beefeaters proceeded to light all the remaining candles around the Dining Hall.

Suddenly, out of the silence, four trumpet flourishes announced the beginning of the actual Yule services with the singing of "Caput Apri Defero, Reddens Laudes Domino." During the singing of this carol, the Boar's head was brought into the Hall by the Minstrels.

After the Boar's Head and accoutrements had been placed on a center table, the shepherds entered singing hymns of praise as they searched for the new born Messiah. Also in quest of the Infant King came the Three Kings singing "Kings To Thy Rising." The Kings were portrayed by Neale Lanigan (Europe), William Oshei (Africa), and Craig Gutermuth (Asia).

"Good King Wenceslas" was sung by Randolph Chapman and Arthur Teulon, followed by "Let All Mortal Flesh Keep Silence" by the choir. The formal part of the celebration ended with the recessional, "Adestes Fideles."

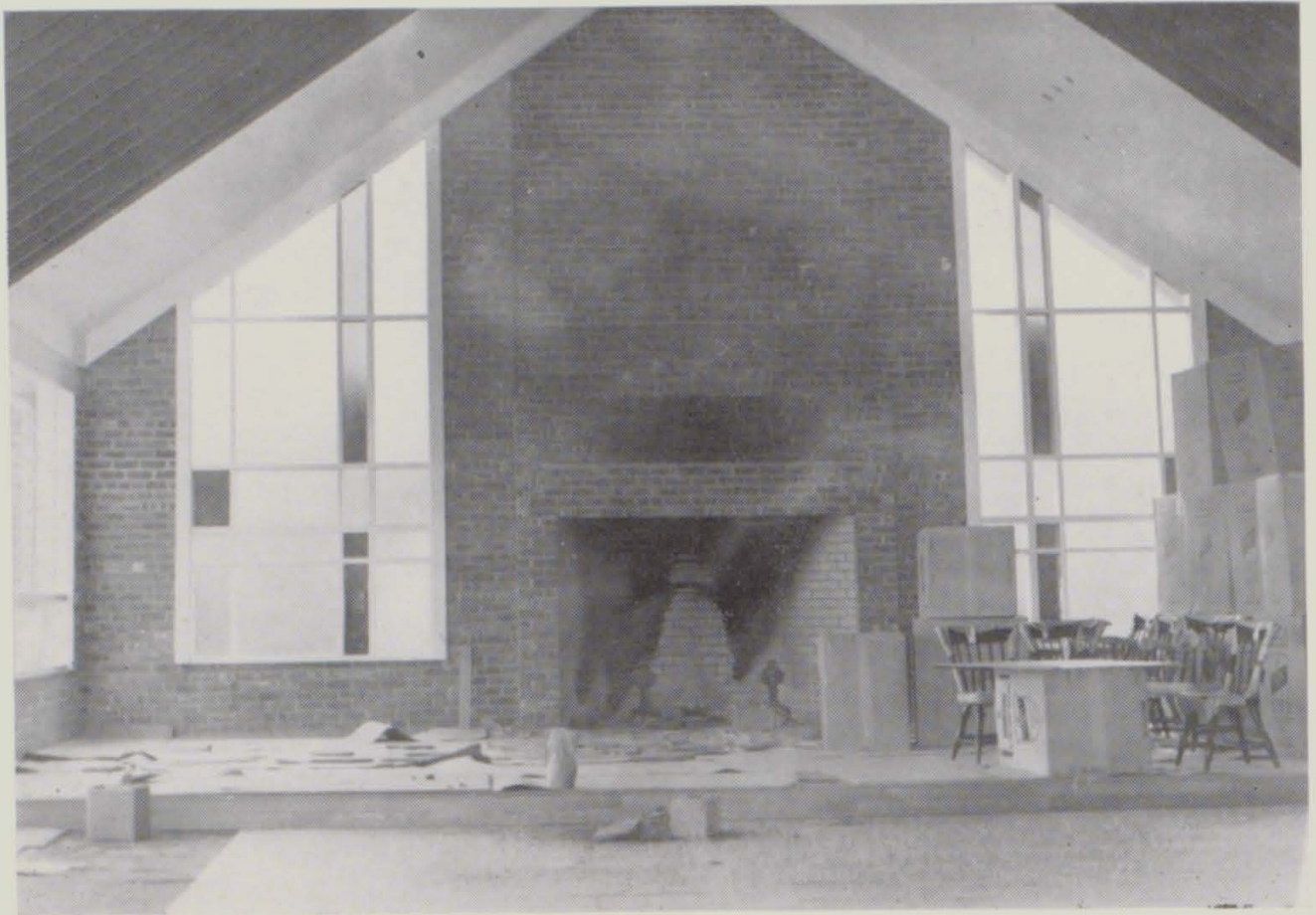

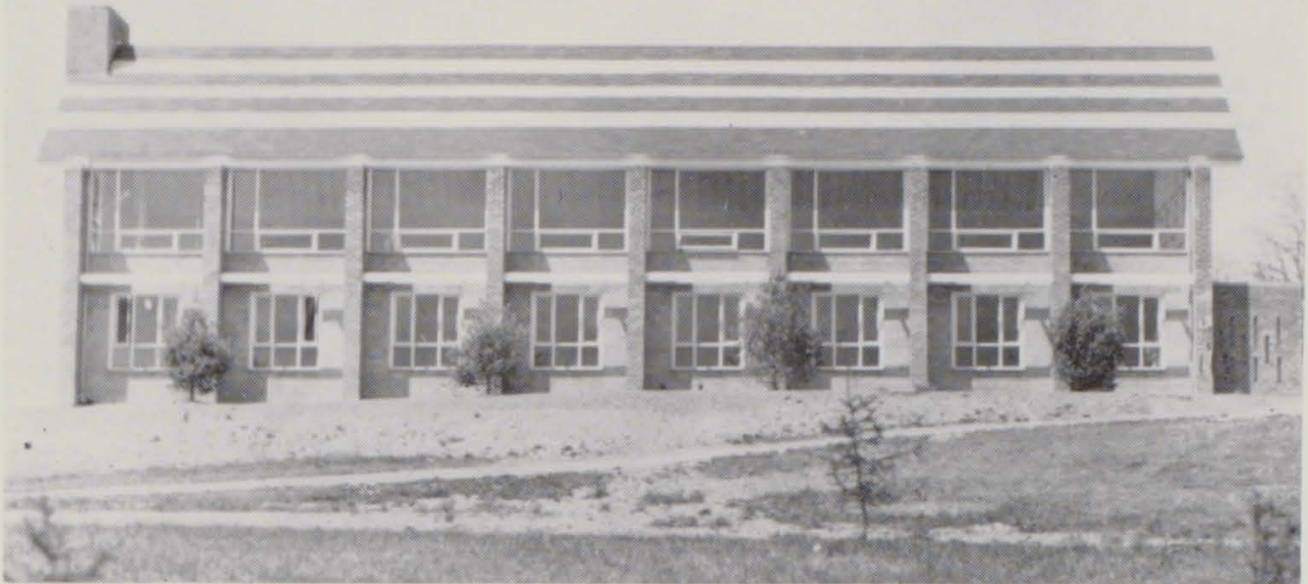

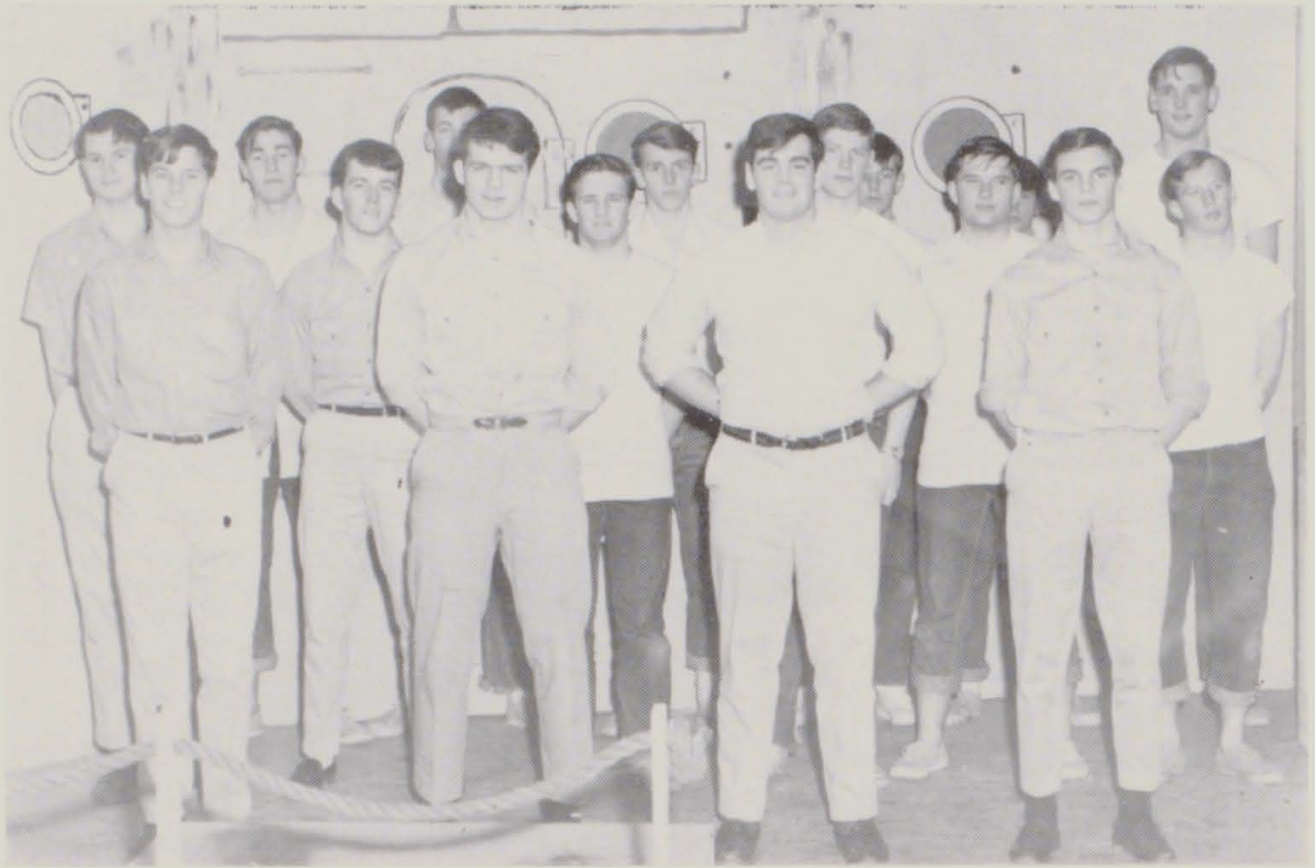


THE MEMORIAL DINING HALL

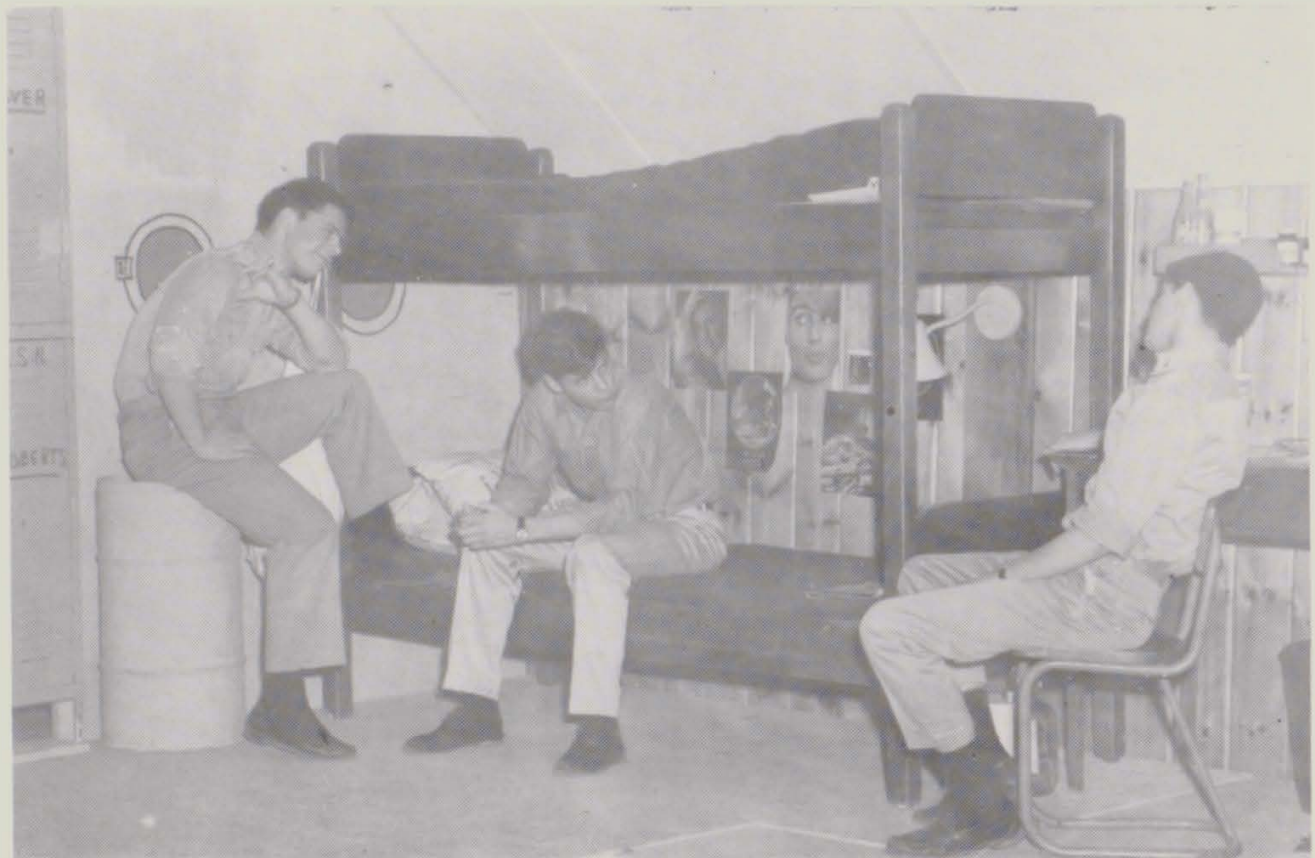

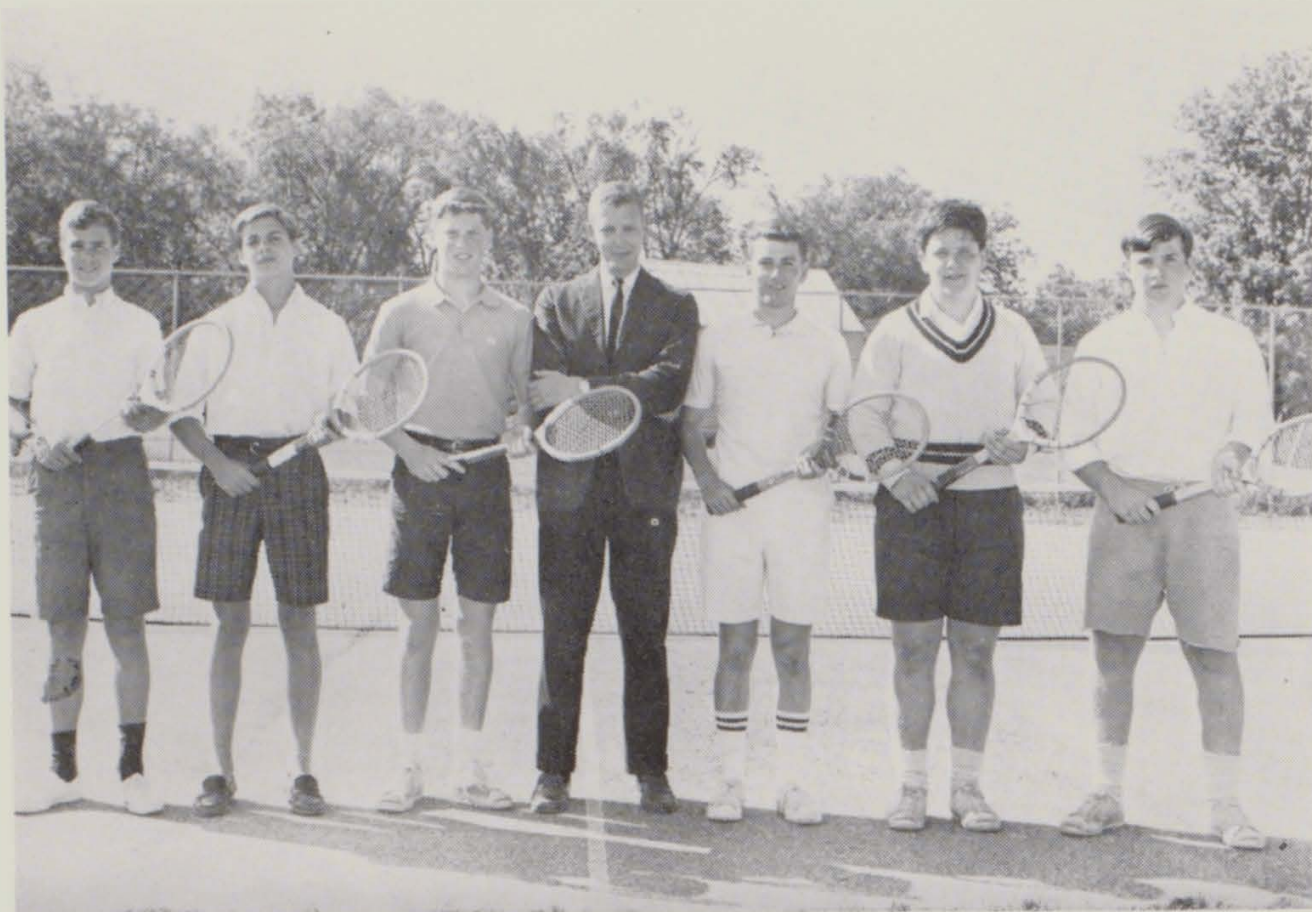
