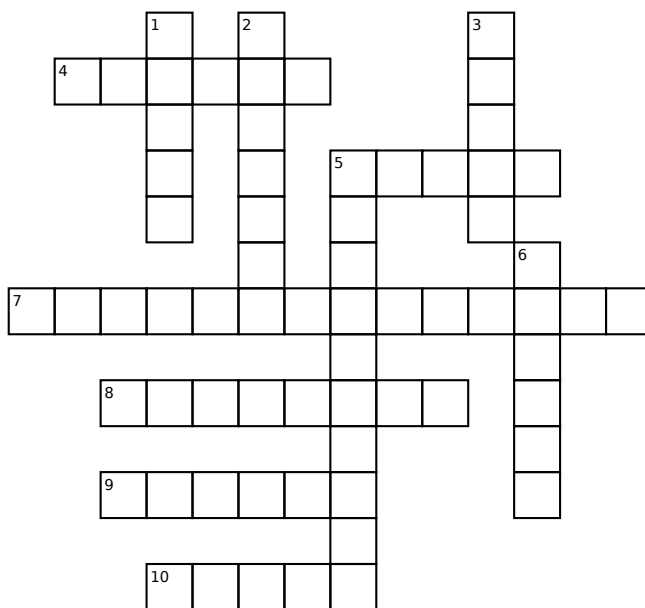

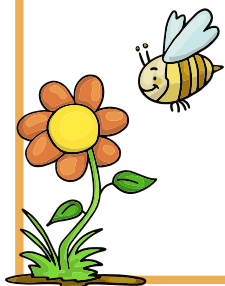


Down:
